




Pastor Gary, a.k.a. "Rev on the Road"...

WHEN PLANS COLLAPSE!!

How many times have you heard the phrase, "What's the plan?" In numerous areas of life we may ask, "What's the plan?"

Before our summer adventure to Minnesota, many Spirit of Grace folks

inquired, "What's your summer plan?" And for the most part I had wide parameters ... go north through Colorado and South Dakota, then onto Minnesota and Wisconsin. On the other hand for many of us years ago, the question was "What are you planning in retirement?" And for the most part, because you have thought about such for years, you have at least a rough outline or plan.



Reality, however, may strike not in terms of carrying out a plan, but having the plan interrupted or terminated by situations beyond our control. Be it finances, illness, family issues ... such is real life.

This summer Sara and I had planned on meeting up with Pastor Linda Gunderson. We had made plans with Pastor Linda and were all set to gather in a couple of weeks. She had recently retired in May from a congregation in Delaware and planned to be at her lake property in Minnesota for a month, then Italy for two months with friends, then back to Delaware to figure out her future direction. Sounds like a great plan doesn't it?

However, reality struck when she was at her Minnesota lake property with her daughter and sister. They had just come in from paddle boarding, sister and daughter went up to what they called the 'She Shed'. Pastor Linda stayed back to pull some sea weeds, when suddenly her daughter heard a cry for help. Long story shortened, Linda was air lifted to a Fargo, North Dakota hospital.


There she lay in a 'shut in' reality from a stroke, no verbal or physical movement other than flashing her eye lids. Would she survive? ... No. She died two days later while her daughter was reading a book to her!

When Plans Collapse!! ... continued

I am still recovering and struggling from the shock and loss. We had served together for years at Cross of Christ Lutheran in Houston, Minnesota during the 80's. Pastor Linda had also served numerous congregations in Minnesota, and in



the Synod Office before venturing to Delaware for a Call. With her sudden death our plans to share a retirement dinner in her honor would not be, our connecting after many years would not be ... her retirement plans would not be. Memories are all that are left for her family and friends. Linda's plans collapsed with her last breath at age 66!

Life at times just doesn't seem fair. I have seen such truth unfolded throughout decades of ministry. Is there a lesson to be learned, a path to be followed, a positive response in the midst of despair? No. There are no easy answers. After all in the *midst of the valley,* others may say, *make the most of each day* ... but that sounds so shallow in light of losing a *planned or hope filled future for oneself or others.*

Scripture says, "Ye though I walk through the darkness...I will fear no evil for thou art

When we put our problems in **God's hands,** He puts His peace in our hearts. with me." Reality is, even though we are promised God's presence, valleys of darkness mean STRUGGLE, PAIN, and AT TIMES SEEMINGLY ARE NEVER ENDING. We have all been in such places in varying degrees and circumstances. That said, valleys of darkness can also be times and places of transformation. We are not who we used to be, but we are not yet who we are becoming. Through believing in our God who believes in

us, through the support of caring professionals, family, and friends, transition can occur.

We can't change the past, but we can *be changed* by the past and yet transformed for a future of hope and newness in the present. Can such be your plan, if so, remember you have to work the plan That is to say, moving forward each day, not imprisoned by the past, rather by God's grace

(God's undeserved blessing and favor) daily seeking transformation, thus being emboldened for the future).

GriefShare is a Christ-centered small group. Each GriefShare session includes a video seminar featuring top experts on grief recovery, plus real people sharing their real stories. After each video presentation, we spend time as a group discussing what was presented and how it applies to what is going on in our lives.

While pondering my subject matter for this month's article, I thought long and hard about what the members of our congregation all have in common. A few things came to mind, but most important is our need for companionship and friendship. While we are very welcoming to all those who walk through our church doors, how does that translate in our personal lives? We may have acquaintances, but do we have close friendships?

You know what I mean.... that person you can call in a crisis, when you are sad or happy. That person who has your back and can keep a confidence. Some of us are lucky enough to have lifelong friends, although the older we get the fewer of those there are.

A notification popped up on my phone reminding me that August 6 was National Friendship Day (according to American Greetings and Hallmark, who originated the designation in 1919). This day encourages people across the country and world to connect with friends, make a new friend or reconnect with an old one. *It encourages us to do the following:*

Accept an invitation to meet new people.

Extend an invitation to someone you may have just met and would like to get to know better. Meet for coffee, lunch or even just a phone call is a good start.

Reach out to old friends. This is especially important if you have friends who have lost a spouse. Many times, friends who were couples stop calling and inviting the surviving spouse to events they used to be invited to as a couple. Sometimes people just don't know what to say, so it is easier to stay away. Reach out. Share your feelings. If you are the surviving spouse, reach out to your friends and tell them how you feel and that you want them in your life.

Talk about a memory with old friends to spark a fun conversation.

Tell your friends how much you appreciate them.

I am grateful for the relationships and lessons learned from friends who have died, the unconditional love showed to me from current friends, and anticipation for new friends I have yet to meet.

Two people are better off than one, for they can help each other succeed.



The theme for these activities is: "**A FUTURE WITH HOPE.**" Remember that phrase! You will be hearing that a lot over the coming weeks and months.



FROM THE CHURCH LIBRARY...

September 2, 2023 marks the 78th anniversary of Japan's surrender and the end of World War II. Two books, both recently made into movies, celebrate men who sacrificed to make that victory possible.

READING GIVES US SOMEPLACE TO GO WHEN WE HAVE TO STAY WHERE WE ARE.




Unbroken, by Laura Hillenbrand, is the story of Louis

Zamperini, a San Francisco boy whose willful ways at first led him into trouble with the law but later fueled his determination to became a runner who made it all the way to the 1936 Olympics. At the approach of WWII, he enlisted in the Army Air Corps and was shot down on a rescue mission over the Pacific. After 47 days on a rubber raft with only rainwater to drink and the occasional bird or fish caught for food, he was picked up by the Japanese and sent to a POW camp. For two and a half years, he was subjected to humiliation, starvation, medical experiments, slave labor, disease and assault. One of every three American pris-

oners of the Japanese died but Zamperini survived to celebrate his liberation at the end of the war. In spite of the book's title, Zamperini was, like many returning soldiers, a broken man, troubled by alcoholism, flashbacks, nightmares and rage. His greatest battle was ahead...the battle to regain his faith in God and to forgive his enemies. In 1949, he was converted to Christ by Billy Graham, and only then did his war end. "When he thought of his history, what resonated with him was not all that he had suffered but the divine love that he believed had intervened to save him."

American Prometheus, by Kai Bird and Martin J. Sherwin, is the story of J. Robert Oppenheimer, the man who helped develop the atomic bomb that ended the war and then wrestled for the rest of his life with its deadly consequences. Oppenheimer was a man of paradoxes, a flailing lecturer who became a dynamic teacher, a scientist who never won the Nobel prize but inspired many of his students who did. He valued discipline as a way to remain detached from the world he wished to preserve. He supported liberal social justice causes and labor unions but gave up those affiliations in order to beat



the Nazis. Never an administrator, he was an unlikely choice to head the Manhattan Project that made the bomb. Nevertheless, he transformed the bleak Los Alamos mesa into the world's most potent nuclear weapons laboratory. After the war, he predicted the race among nations to develop bigger, more powerful bombs, advocated international controls and opposed the testing of a hydrogen bomb. A victim of the McCarthy era *red scare*, his security clearance was revoked and his work for the government ended in disgrace. "*Oppenheimer's greatest tragedy was that he wasn't able to save the future from his own invention."*
